

# New Student Course Selection

## Fall 2011

Fall 2011 Semester 1 course selection - Please read the Registration Handbook for New Students first. While following the Semester One Course Selection guidelines, you will also be taking courses for your major, minor or area of concentration. A course taken for your major will also fulfill an arts or social science requirement as appropriate.

Below is more detailed course selection information for each specialization. When choosing your courses, you should also consult the Schedule of Studies (list of required courses) and Course descriptions for each subject area. The list of all the required courses for areas of concentration, majors and minors are found at:

**Note:** you are only choosing courses for the Fall semester only at this time. You will choose your Winter semester courses during October.

### **Anthropology**

- ANTH\*1150 is offered every semester but it is recommended that it be taken in your first semester.
- LING\*1000 is only offered in Winter semesters.

### **Applied Mathematics and Statistics**

- it is required to take CIS1500 and MATH1200 in the Fall semester
- you also will take 1.5 credits from Arts and Social Science specializations

### **Art History**

- ARTH\*1220 and ARTH 1510 are only offered in Fall semester and ARTH\*1520 is only offered in Winter semester.

### **Classical Studies**

- CLAS\*1000 is offered both Fall and Winter semesters. It is recommended that you take this course in your first semester along with one of the Greek or Latin courses.
- GREK\*1100 is only offered in the Fall and cannot be taken if you have taken Greek at secondary school (Level 4). If you have achieved this level at secondary school, you would proceed directly to GREK\*1110 in the Winter semester. You do not receive credit for GREK\*1100 toward your degree. You would need to take another acceptable Classics course to replace this requirement.
- LAT\*1100/LAT\*1110 - same as above

### **Criminal Justice and Public Policy**

- there are three 1000 level courses required - PHIL\*1010, POLS\*1400 and SOC\*1500. It is recommended that you only take two of these courses in your first semester.
- POLS\*1400 is only offered in the Fall semester
- PHIL\* 1010 and SOC\*1500 are offered both Fall and Winter semesters

### **Economics (Regular and Co-op)**

-ECON\*1050 is to be taken in the first semester. It is the prerequisite for ECON\*1100 which is taken in the second semester.

### **English**

- it is important to take ENGL\*1080 in the Fall semester but it is also offered in the Winter semester. There is a restriction on the course which allows only students in the English major or area of concentration to add the course at this time. If you have not been admitted to the English specialization, you will need to wait until September to declare this new specialization. You would then have accessibility to add ENGL\*1080 during the add period (which ends on September 16) or for a subsequent semester (i.e Winter 2012).

- ENGL\*1200 and ENGL\*1410 are elective courses for those who have an interest in the subject area but do not plan on completing a major, minor or area of concentration.

- both courses will allow access to upper level courses

### **Environmental Governance**

-ECON\*1050 is offered in both semesters. It is the prerequisite for ECON\*1100 which is NOT required for this program however if you would like to take ECON1100, you should take 1050 in the Fall semester

-GEOG1220 and GEOG1350 are offered both Fall and Winter

-POL\*1400 is only offered in the Fall semester

### **European Studies**

- EURO\*1200 is only offered in the Fall semesters and EURO1050 is offered in the Winter. It is strongly recommended that you take EURO\*1200 in your first semester.

- CLAS\*1000 is offered both Fall and Winter semesters.

- you should take one course from your chosen language (French, German, Italian or Spanish).

- if European Business is your intended Area of Emphasis, ECON\*1050 should be taken in the first semester

- if European Culture and Civilization is chosen, you may wish to take one course at the 1000 level from the acceptable lists

### **Food, Agricultural and Resource Economics**

-FARE\*1300 and AGR\*1250 are offered only in the Winter semester

-ECON\*1050 should be taken in the Fall semester. It is the prerequisite for ECON\*1100 which is normally taken in semester 2.

-one of MATH1080 – offered Fall and Winter or MATH1200 – offered in the Fall are needed as well

## **French Studies**

- FREN\*1200 is the only first year level required course. You would take this course in your first semester if you have 4U core French.
- if you have graduated from a secondary school French Immersion program, you will not be allowed to take FREN\*1200 or FREN\*2030. You would begin with one of FREN\*2020, FREN\*2060 or FREN\*2520 in your first semester. You must consult with the School of Languages & Literatures (1-519-824-4120 ext. 53884) for permission to add these courses.
- if you wish to specialize in French and do not have 4U core French, there are French courses offered to provide you with the necessary background to prepare you to take FREN\*1200. You should consult the course descriptions (<http://www.uoguelph.ca/registrar/calendars/undergraduate/current/c12/c12fren.shtml>) and the French Studies department (519-824-4120 ext. 53884) for further information.

## **Geography**

- there are three first year required courses - GEOG\*1200, GEOG\*1220 and GEOG\*1300- which can be taken over the first two semesters
- there is no specific sequence of how these courses should be taken as they are different from each other and all are offered both Fall and Winter semesters

## **Hispanic Studies (formerly Spanish)**

- depending on your secondary school background, you could start with either HISP\*1100, HISP\*1110 or HISP\*2000. All of these courses are offered in both the Fall and Winter semesters. ## **History**

- HIST\*1010 is the only required first year course and it can be taken in either Fall or Winter but it is recommended that you take it in the first semester
- HIST\*1150 and HIST\*1250 are electives and are offered in both the Fall and Winter semesters

## **Information Systems and Human Behaviour**

- this major uses courses from Computing & Information Science, Psychology, Sociology and Anthropology
- it is recommended that you take CIS\*1500 in the Fall and CIS\*1910 in the Winter semester. CIS\*1910 is only offered in the Winter semester
- you can take one of PSYC\*1100 and PSYC\*1200 in each of your first two semesters. They are offered both Fall and Winter and there is no particular sequence that should be followed with these two courses.
- ANTH\*1150 and SOC\*1100 are also offered both Fall and Winter and should be taken over two semesters
- STAT\*2040 is a required course and has a mathematics prerequisite. If you do not have 4U Advanced Functions and Calculus or equivalent, you should consult with the Departmental Advisor for an appropriate Mathematics course to take in your first year.

### **International Development (ID)**

- ANTH\*1150 can be taken in either Fall or Winter
- ECON\*1050 should be taken in the first semester and ECON\*1100 in the second semester. ECON\*1050 is a prerequisite for ECON\*1100.
- WMST\*1000 is one of the options in the core. It is only offered in Fall semesters. You can choose to take another course from the restricted list in a later semester.
- FARE 1300 is one of the options in the core. It is only offered in Winter semesters. You can choose to take another course from the restricted list in a later semester.
- during the first semester you may also be choosing a course from your intended Area of Emphasis (if necessary)
- it is also recommended that ID students pursue an additional language

### **Mathematical Economics (regular and co-op)**

- CIS1500 is recommended for semester 1 (is offered Fall and Winter)
- ECON\*1050 should be taken in the first semester and ECON\*1100 in the second semester. ECON\*1050 is a prerequisite for ECON\*1100.
- MATH\*1200 should be taken in the first semester and MATH\*1210 in the second semester

### **Mathematics**

- CIS1500 is recommended for semester 1 (is offered Fall and Winter)
- MATH\*1200 should be taken in the first semester and MATH\*1210 in the second semester
- if you do not have 4U Advanced Functions and Calculus, you should consult the Departmental Advisor for an appropriate Mathematics course to take in your first semester

### **Music**

- MUSC\*1180 and MUSC1060 (core courses) are offered both Fall and Winter
- MUSC\*1500 is an elective course and requires an audition. You should contact the School of Fine Art and Music during the first week of September to arrange an audition time.

### **Philosophy**

- there are three first year Philosophy courses available each Fall and Winter semester - PHIL\*1000, PHIL\*1010 and PHIL\*1050
- any one of these courses can be taken as preparation for upper level courses
- you can take more than one of these courses however, only one can be used toward a Major, Minor or Area of Concentration

### **Political Science**

- POLS\*1150 is the only required first year course and it is offered both Fall and Winter semesters. It is recommended that you take it in your first semester.
- POLS\*1400 and POLS\*1500 can be taken as electives. Both courses are offered in the Fall semester only.

### **Psychology**

- PSYC\*1100 and PSYC\*1200 are required courses and are offered both Fall and Winter semesters. It is recommended that you only take one of these courses in your first semester. It does not matter which course you take first.

### **Psychology Co-op**

- both PSYC\*1100 and PSYC\*1200 are to be taken in the first semester. Please refer to the Schedule of Studies ([www.uoguelph.ca/undergrad\\_calendar/c10/c10ba-psyc-c.shtml](http://www.uoguelph.ca/undergrad_calendar/c10/c10ba-psyc-c.shtml))

### **Sociology**

- both ANTH\*1150 and SOC\*1100 are required. It is recommended that you take one in each of the Fall and Winter semesters. These courses are offered both semesters and it does not matter which course you take first.

### **Statistics**

- CIS\*1500, MATH\*1200 and MATH\*1210 are required courses  
- it is recommended that MATH\*1200 be taken in the first semester and both CIS\*1500 and MATH\*1210 be taken in the second semester

### **Studio Art**

- ARTH\*1220, ARTH\*1520, SART\*1050 and SART\*1060 are required courses  
- ARTH\*1220 is only offered in the Fall semester and ARTH\*1520 is only offered in the Winter semester so should be taken accordingly in the first year  
- SART\*1050 and SART\*1060 are offered both semesters and cannot be taken together in the same semester. It does not matter which course is taken first but it is recommended that they be completed during the first year.

### **Theatre Studies**

- THST\*1040 is required for all Theatre Studies specializations and is offered both Fall and Winter semesters however, it is recommended that you take it in the first semester  
- THST\*1150 is also required for the Honours Major. This course is only offered in the Winter.  
- THST\*1200 can be used as an elective towards a THST specialization

### **Undeclared Major**

- during the first semester, a variety of courses should be chosen from the arts and social science areas that are of interest to you (see the Registration Handbook for New Students for the subjects that meet these areas). By taking different courses, you will have the opportunity to explore potential specializations. You are still on track for a B.A. degree by doing this.
