2018 marks the centenary of the death of Guelph-born doctor, poet and soldier John McCrae. Guelph Museums is planning commemoration activities in Guelph and in Belgium and France, where Lt. Col. McCrae served during the First World War and where he is buried.

Your experiential learning opportunity will involve researching and assisting with the planning of a local commemoration ceremony to be held in Guelph January 28, 2018 and a graveside service to be held in Wimereux, France May 2, 2018. You will work with and be supported by the Museum's manager, supervisor of visitor experiences, and Commemoration Committee. Your tasks will include researching best practices in commemoration activities and graveside services, and developing the program and protocol manual for the graveside service, considering perspectives of military, faith, family and the community.

In connecting this work experience to your academic discipline you will write a series of short critical reflections and a research paper analyzing commemoration activities from local and international perspectives.

Weeks 4-12: Research program elements and protocols for graveside ceremonies

Week 6: First collection of weekly Reflections is due covering weeks 1-5

Week 12: Second collection of weekly Reflections is due covering weeks 6-10

Week 13: Document Analysis is due

Articles will be submitted at various points over the semester and meetings will be held with the professor and Ms. Adkin.
