CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This seminar course is designed to explore one or more issues in Art and Visual Culture (Western Art) depending on the expertise of the instructor. Students should consult the department for specific offerings.

Prerequisite(s): 10.00 credits including 1.00 credits in Art History at the 3000 level.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will examine important medieval manuscripts from the British Isles and Ireland. Several of the most beautifully illustrated manuscripts to be examined include the Book of Durrow, the Book of Kells, the Lindisfarne Gospels, the Winchester Bible, and the Aberdeen Bestiary. The course will examine the iconography of these and other manuscripts and the manner in which they were made including an analysis of the pigments used as well as an investigation of the scribes and artists responsible for their making. These books are an important key to understanding the cultural and theological history of Ireland and England.

NOTE: This seminar is 1.0 credit.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Define the major art and architectural movements of the medieval period
- Identify canonical manuscripts from this period
- Define and apply terminology relevant to medieval manuscripts
- Classify canonical artworks as belonging to a particular style/movement
- Explain the intersections between cultural contexts and developing artistic practices in the medieval period
- Write formal or visual analyses of medieval art and architecture

There is no specific text. Readings will be assigned on a weekly basis.
