Brief Course Synopsis: Canadian Literature in an Age of Environmental Crisis

This course explores the ways in which Canadian literature foregrounds the relevance of ecological questions and environmental concerns. In an age of environmental crisis, Canadian writers are raising public awareness of our "toxic environment" that is byproducts of capitalist modernity. Canadian environmental literature makes visible the unseen or culturally neglected environmental degradation and disposable excess that characterize our toxic environment. Engaging with recent scholarship in ecocriticism that challenges us to recognize other forms of subjectivity and the ecological interconnectedness of different forms of biological life and their natural surroundings, we will examine the ways in which Canadian writers employ the novel—which places environmental issues in a larger context that a more conventional work cannot provide—to raise public consciousness of our environmental crisis, incite public sentiment against accelerated and continuous environmental destruction, and strengthen the shared production of knowledge and mobilization of communities confronting environmental injustice.
