Brief Course Synopsis (subject to change):

The representation of difference and the problem of difference in representation are central concerns of contemporary literary and cultural theory. In this seminar, we will consider articulations of these concerns in and beyond exemplary works of Marxist-materialist, poststructuralist, postcolonial and feminist theory. Ongoing issues and topics for discussion may include: speech-writing distinctions and the attribution of voice; the aesthetic and political dimensions and implications of representation; philosophical and ethical questions concerning otherness and "the other"; alterity, the environment and globalization; social and historical determinations of difference.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight (subject to change): Seminar Presentation & Short Paper (30%); Response to Seminar presentation (10%); Final Essay Proposal (10%); Research Paper based on individually devised research question 4500-6000 words (40%); Study Questions (10%)
