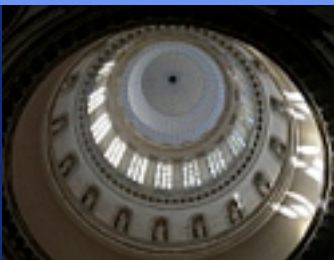


# European Studies Major

Interdisciplinary Program 2011-2012



## Student Information Guide

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The European Studies Program is designed for students who seek a career in International Relations - especially in International Business and Administration - between Canada and Europe. It offers a combination of languages, specially designed courses in European thought, letters and history, a specialization in either European Business or European Culture and Civilization, and an opportunity to study abroad.

Successful completion of the European Studies major requires proficiency in one of the following languages (French, German, Italian or Spanish). In order to demonstrate language proficiency, students have two options: they may study for a year at a European University, in a country where their chosen core language is spoken, or they may write a final research paper in the chosen core language within a required fourth year European Studies course (EURO\* 4740). Students who can demonstrate that they have written a major academic paper or exam in their chosen language while participating in an approved study abroad year will be waived from the requirement of EURO\*4740.

**It is highly recommended that students spend their third year studying at a European university, in a country where their chosen core language is spoken.**

# Program Requirements

A minimum of 12.50 credits is required, including:

- a) 7.50 credits of core requirements (3 sets, see below 1st, 2nd, and 3rd component)
- b) 5.00 credits in either the European Culture and Civilization or the European Business Studies Area of Emphasis

## 1st component (all of the following):

Winter. No prerequisites.

EURO\*1200 [0.50] European Culture from the Mid 18th to the Mid 19th Century

Fall. No prerequisites.

EURO\*2200 [0.50] European Culture from the Mid 19<sup>th</sup> Century to the 1920's

Fall. Prerequisites: [EURO\\*1200](#) is recommended

EURO\*2300 [0.50] European Culture since 1920

Winter. Prerequisites: [EURO\\*1200](#) and

[EURO\\*2200](#) are recommended

EURO\*4740 [0.50] Research Project in European Studies

Prerequisites: EURO\*1050, 1200, 2200, 2300.

### Notes:

-EURO 1200, 2200 and 2300 are best taken in that order and early in the program. Since they are interdisciplinary, it is more difficult to find equivalents for these than for other courses during study abroad.

- Note: in order to demonstrate language proficiency, students must write a research paper ([EURO\\*4740](#)) in their core language unless they have spent one year studying at a European university, in the country where their chosen core language is spoken. Where that is the case, a course taken in that year involving a major academic paper in the core language will, upon approval of the Co-ordinator for European Studies, count towards [EURO\\*4740](#).

Notes about language courses:

- The required language courses in French, German, Italian or Spanish are intended to provide the students with sufficient fluency to pursue part of their studies abroad. All of our partner universities offer native language courses for foreigners.
- Although the core requires only 1 language, it is strongly recommended that students acquire competence in more than 1 foreign language.
- Students who have no prior knowledge of their core language may still major in ESP, but will require first year level language courses as preparation for the required courses.
- Begin your language courses early in your studies and take as many as possible before the year abroad, in order to prepare for it.

*1. Most of the third and fourth year level courses have prerequisites (check Calendar under the individual departments). However, these are sometimes waived for European Studies students (speak to course instructors or undergraduate advisors of the individual departments).*

*2. Substitutions are possible with the approval of the ESP coordinator. In particular, courses taken during the year of study abroad may be substituted for ones on the list, provided that: they correspond in discipline + (roughly) level and amount of work, and that they have a focus on Europe (for example, courses in political science with a focus on the EU may be counted as part of group D).*

2. You will not be able to enroll in some of these courses unless you have declared your major (ESP) and area of emphasis (European Business). Please contact the coordinator of European Studies if you continue to have difficulty registering.
3. EURO 4600 [0.50] Honours Seminar in European Studies. Prerequisites: 10.00 credits, (2 of [ARTH\\*1520](#), [EURO\\*1050](#), [EURO\\*1200](#), [EURO\\*2200](#), [EURO\\*2300](#), [HIST\\*2510](#), [HIST\\*3090](#), [MUSC\\*1060](#), [POLS\\*3450](#)) Can be counted as a restricted elective for both areas of emphasis (a signature from the ESP coordinator is necessary for this).

### Study and Work Abroad:

Year 3 or year 4 will provide students with the opportunity to continue their studies abroad. Students will select up to 6.00 credits which can be included in the area of emphasis, as electives, or both. They are subject to approval by the program coordinator and the departmental advisor. Courses taken in Europe will not count towards the specialization average.

### Practicum Opportunity:

[HUMN\\*3501/2](#) is available for those students wishing to participate in a practicum experience as part of the year abroad. The practicum must be a job or volunteer experience that contributes to the student's area of study and intended career. It must be approved in advance as a Letter of Permission by the Coordinator. A final report, written in the student's chosen language, is a requirement of this course.
