CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course examines music from the late 19th century (Debussy and post-romantic composers) to the present from both historical and theoretical perspectives.

Prerequisite(s): MUSC*2660, (MUSC*2330 or MUSC*2620)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course examines the history of the Western art music tradition from ca. 1900 to the present. We will be engaging with the music through listening, score reading and analysis, and readings and research with an emphasis on music history in a social context. Classes will be lecture based with discussions about assigned reading and listening examples, as well as student presentations on musical analysis. Supplementary readings, discussions and presentations will also contribute to understanding changes in musicology since the 1980s.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Distinguish different concepts and methods in composition through score reading and analysis.
- Compare ideologies of composers with reference to important themes such as modernism, avant-gardism, postmodernism, nationalism, politics, technology, and significant historical events.
- Aurally and visually identify works of the Western art music canon, and express their musical and historical significance.
- Use a variety of sources for research and a critical evaluation of materials to produce a scholarly essay on a specific topic.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the field of musicology with an emphasis on changes since the 1980s.
