### John McMurtry retires

John McMurtry has been a member of our department since 1970, after getting his Ph.D. from the London School of Economics under Jerry Cohen. In his teaching, publications, and public advocacy he has always been a champion of the underdog and a challenger of the overdog, whether at the level of global economy or university politics. He is a person of strong convictions, but he has also been flexible enough to learn from experience. In the early part of his career John was so infused with the spirit of the sixties that he regarded grades as an unnecessary evil, and would have allowed the students to assign their own grades if he could have. It would be hard to recognize that academic anarchist in the rigorous mentor that he has become, who holds his students to demanding levels of achievement and assessment.

Just as he was flexible in his development as a teacher, as a theorist he avoided any rigid, uncritical commitment to a party line. He began life as a Marxist, but had enough intellectual curiosity and openness to other ways of doing things to be able to appreciate non-Marxist philosophies as different as Nietzsche, Mencius, and the Bhagavad Gita. In fact, far from seeing Asian philosophies as opiates of the masses, John was the one who kept Oriental Philosophy on the books when no one else was interested in teaching it, and was responsible for expanding it from a single course to two separate courses. However strong he may be in his convictions, those convictions always spring from independent inquiry rather than from blind adherence. - Ken Dorter
