Welcome to the new academic year! If it seems busier around the department this year, it could be because we have many more students this Fall. Our enrolments are up 7% over last year. This has driven our class sizes up, and we have a lot of interest in our Major programme. I think the only reason we survived the first week of classes was that Linda put signs around the department saying, "You are not in the classroom wing. If you are looking for a classroom, go downstairs...".

We are also welcoming a large and accomplished entering class of 4 MA and 7 PhD students. These students are bringing with them OGS Masters, OGS Doctoral and SSHRC Doctoral fellowships.

I'm sure all the faculty join me in welcoming our new graduate students. Arriving to do MAs are Evan Clarke, Rick Duchalski, Rebecca Olivier and Jennifer Rinaldi. For PhDs, John Lundy, Megan Penney, Brad Richards, Jason Robinson, Reiner Schaefer, Sasa Stankovic and Anthony Vander Schaaf are new this fall. All have interesting research ideas, which the department looks forward to helping them develop.

On the other end of things, this summer saw several successful final oral examinations:

- Anthony Vander Schaaf, "Plagiarism: a philosophical analysis of property, theft and deception" (advisor: Jay Newman).
- Daniel Mullin, "Difficulties surrounding the apologetic use of worldview in contemporary Calvinist scholarship" (advisor: Jay Newman).

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- Jeff Spring, "Towards a capabilities theory of rights" (advisor: Karen Wendling).
- David Peck, "Tacit Knowledge and Practical Action: Polanyi, Hacking, Heidegger and the Tacit Dimension" (advisor: Andrew Wayne).

We have a PhD final oral examination upcoming, that of Carolyn Swanson on October 13. Carolyn will defend her dissertation "Reburial of object theory: reconsidering the Meinong-Russell debate," written with Nick Griffin (of McMaster University) as advisor, Peter Loftson as co-advisor and Andrew Bailey as third reader. Bernard Linsky, of the University of Alberta, is coming to Guelph to serve as external examiner.

Incidentally, all final oral examinations are, by University policy, open to the public. It's a great idea especially for graduate students to come to them to see what they're like as well as to be exposed to some philosophical work that might be outside their area, and, not least, to support their peers at the culmination of such a substantial achievement. - *Mark McCullagh*

As continuing Undergraduate Coordinator, my goal is to continue building on last year's efforts to boost the profile of Philosophy amongst undergraduates with the goal of attracting more Majors. At last count, the number of students enrolled in a philosophy program (i.e., Majors, Minors, and Area of Concentration students) was 173. The number of students enrolled in our courses, by contrast, is well over 4000. My strategy is therefore to tap into our obvious popularity so as to convince students not merely to take our courses, which they are already doing, but to enroll in our programs.

To this end, I will be organizing a 'Meet the Faculty' event in October, and another in the Winter Term.
