Celtic Britain and Ireland to 1066

Review the social, political and cultural history of the Celtic peoples of the British Isles from prehistory to the advent of the Normans. Special consideration is given to the development of Celtic institutions and the influence of the successive waves of invasions by the Romans, Anglo-Saxons, Vikings, and Normans.

Celtic Britain and Ireland from 1603

Develop an appreciation for the Celtic peoples in the British Isles and their effort to maintain their cultural, economic and political independence.

COURSES—CONTINUED

Scottish Literary Cultures

Learn about selected issues and ideas within sixteenth to early twentieth century Scottish national literature. The primary focus is on literature of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Special attention is given to issues relating to nationhood, identity, religion, colonialism, gender, and class in relation to selected examples from literary texts and folktales.

The British Isles 1066-1603

Examine the histories of England, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales during the Medieval and Early Modern eras. Discover common themes such as institutional development, warfare and the often violent interaction between the English and the Celtic peoples.

The Landscape of Scotland

Explore the Scottish landscape and its natural resources through a major research project, on any topic from geology, through forestry, agriculture, parks and recreation, to modern tourism. You will consider the relationship between the land itself, its history, and the use made of that land today. The course emphasizes relationships between the natural environment and human society and how those relationships are managed.

Topics in Scottish History

Examine the movement of Scots to Canada as part of the great Scottish exodus of the 18th and 19th centuries. The themes examined include the reasons for leaving family and home, the socio-economic state of Scotland including the challenge of 'clearance', the journey across, and transplanting the old culture in a new world. The course also touches on issues surrounding religion, and on rural settlements and urban life in Canada.

Witch-hunts and Popular Culture

Discover the phenomenon of the 'witch-hunts' in early modern Europe through a focus on Scotland in the period 1560-1700. Explore notions of both elite culture and the 'popular culture' of those elements of society frequently neglected by historians.
