MFA Studio Art Graduate Students

Many of our first year students have moved from across the country to join our program, bringing with them vibrant and diverse art practices. **Laura Madera**, who hails from Vancouver and who completed her BFA at the Emily Carr Institute, recently showed at Tatar Gallery as part of the Nuit Blanche in Toronto this past September.

Katie Brennan, also from Vancouver and a fellow graduate from the Emily Carr Institute recently organized an open field trip to the Toronto International Art Fair. At TIAF, many of SOFAM's faculty and former graduates were represented including Monica Tap, Sadko Hadzihasonovic, Martin Golland and Melanie Authier. Brennan has also joined the Graduate Students Association Board, taking on the position of the General Director of Fine Arts.

Beth Stuart, who completed her BFA at Concordia and who comes to us from Toronto, has taken on the position of Graduate Rep for The Fine Arts Network, the undergraduate student organization.

Throughout the duration of study, faculty advisors work closely with students in directing individual artwork and research projects.

Monica Tap begins her new role this year as graduate coordinator. She takes over from Will Gorlitz who has held this position for the past several years and who is currently on sabbatical 2007-2008.

Joining us from Montreal, **Erin Fraser** completed her undergraduate work at the University of Victoria. She has been working with **Kristoff Steinruck** to bring about the 2nd Annual Double Header, which is an event that brings the master's students and the Specialized Studio Practice students (4th year senior studio students) together to work on collaborative projects for a group exhibition to be held in the winter semester. Kristoff received his BA undergraduate degree from the University of British Columbia.

Margaret Flood comes to us from Toronto; she completed her BFA at NSCAD (Nova Scotia College of Art and Design) and continues her concurrent music practice, in which her band Whispering Xylophone is celebrating its tenth year anniversary. Not only do our new MFA students come from a variety of places, they also work in a variety of mediums. Danny Woodrow, an NSCAD graduate as well, but originally from Newfoundland, is one of 4 painters in the program. Hyang Cho finished her undergraduate work at ACAD (the Alberta College of Art and Design) and is one of 4 multi-disciplinary artists in the program.

Our returning and second year MFA students have launched into a busy third semester filled with TA-ing responsibilities, grad seminar and studio work. They are: Remi Aurora, Victoria Cheung, Maura Doyle, John Eisler, Joel Herman, Kristin Demchuk, Chris Faulkner, and Kevin Rodgers. Over the next two semesters they will be extremely busy as they prepare for their End-of-Semester Critiques and thesis defenses in 2008.

In May-June, Remi Arora participated in the 2-person show Long Distance: Between Location and Emotion Video and works on paper by Abbas Akhavan and Remi Arora, at The Third Line Gallery in Dubai, U.A.E where he showed video works, large format digital still printouts and a series of silkscreened prints (see photo at right). In June, he participated in the group exhibit Video-Salon 2: curatorial rebound project at Galerija 10m2 of the André Malraux Cultural Centre in Sarajevo, Bosnia-Herzegovina, where he showed a video piece Untitled' (Garage) 6:00, colour, 2007. In the same month, Remi also participated in a collaboration project with the contemporary dance choreographer Laurel Koop, during the Guelph Contemporary Dance Festival, for which he produced an electroacoustic composition for the performance.

Robert Enright

Robert Enright, University Research Chair in Art Theory and Criticism, has continued his usual pattern of writing, lecturing and interviewing. In September he interviewed the American artist Ann Hamilton as the sixth guest in the Artist's Talk series co-sponsored by the Perimeter Institute and the Kitchener/Waterloo Art Gallery.

In the special painting issue of "Border Crossings", the art magazine for which he is the Senior Contributing Editor, he published interviews with Lisa Yuskavage, Sean Scully, Shary Boyle and Tony Scherman. In the previous issue, distinguished Canadian artists Vera Frenkel and Michael Snow were the featured interviews. The upcoming special issue on "Words and Pictures", will feature conversations with the Dutch artist Marcel van Eeden, poet and songwriter Leonard Cohen and the American artist, Ed Ruscha. Finally, the September issue of the British art magazine, frieze, included his interview with Stan Douglas. In connection with the current Warhol exhibition at the Winnipeg Art Gallery he conducted an on-stage interview with critic and philosopher, Arthur C. Danto about Warhol, and also reviewed the exhibition for the *Globe & Mail*. In addition to writing he sat as a member of the jury for the Hnatyshyn Foundation to choose the recipients of the Visual Arts Awards. This fall he was also a member of the Ontario Arts Council Jury for magazines.

The revised edition of Professor Enright's "Eric Fischl: 1970 – 2007" (with Arthur Danto and Steve Martin) will be published in late February by the Monacelli Press in New York. He will also complete a series of commissioned interviews with Eric Fischl and April Gornik for the Archives of American Art, located in the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C. In the fall of this year he was awarded a Gold Medal for his contribution to the arts by the R.C.A. (the Royal Canadian Academy).

Monica Tap has a solo exhibition opening November 24 at Wynick Tuck Gallery in Toronto. Titled One-second Hudson, the paintings continue her exploration of video and painting.



Ellen Waterman

This past summer, Ellen Waterman was artist-in-residence at The Art of Immersive Soundscapes II, University of Regina, giving improvisation workshops and concerts (including new works for flute and electronics with James Harley). She is co-editing a book of papers from the conference that was included in this international summer institute. Ellen spent time at The Western Front artist centre in Vancouver in September, on a commission to write a critical essay on the work of Gordon Monahan.

She will present papers at several upcoming conferences including: Comin' Out Swingin': Improvisation and Sexuality at U.B.C., The International Society for Improvised Music at Northwestern University in Illinois, and Musica Ficta/Lived Realities at the University of Toronto. These conference presentations come out of work Ellen is doing with the interdisciplinary SSHRC-MCRI project on Improvisation, Community and Social Practice (ICASP).

ICASP was launched in early September with a gala reception at which alumni improvisers from the Contemporary Music Ensemble performed. Members of ICASP, including Ellen, also performed at the Guelph Jazz Festival under the name (Not Just) Talking Heads.

The project welcomes Tracy McMullen, who has just taken up a post-doctoral position with the Improvisation, Community, and Social Practice project. Tracy recently defended her Ph.D. in the music department at the University of California, San Diego, and will be at U of G for one year researching the relationship between improvisation, gender, and the body.
