#### **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:**

The course will examine the history of collections, traditions of cultural representation and display, and constructions of authenticity, trade and exchange.

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course introduces contemporary issues in museum studies, including the history of the museum and the development of the great national collections. We will also look at the various concepts underpinning collecting and curating and at how the art and ceremonial objects of non-Western peoples have been collected and displayed. Other issues we will consider include recent attempts to integrate First Nations art into the narrative of Canadian art history and we will also look at several controversies that have arisen in Canada around museum and art gallery displays

- Identify the functions of museums
- Define and apply terminology relevant to museum studies
- Understand the role that viewers play in the development of museums
- Explain the interpretive stances and strategies employed by museums
