Brief Course Synopsis:

ENGL 1080 introduces students to English studies wherein close reading is emphasized as a central and standard practice in the field. Through a series of case studies, the course considers a range of historical and national writings in prose, poetry, and drama written in English in various parts of the world, and some key terms and concepts in contemporary literary studies. Lectures and discussion address selected works from the Middle Ages to the present, the periods in which these works were produced, and some of the ways in which these texts have been or could be interpreted. ENGL 1080 and its companion course, ENGL 2080, are required for a major or minor in English. Students are encouraged to enrol in ENGL 2080 in the semester after they have completed ENGL 1080.
