COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Through reading, group discussion, masterclasses with expert accompanists, and practice, students will experience the joys and challenges of accompanying soloists and ensembles. Rehearsals and performances build upon the students' accumulated knowledge of solo piano techniques, while study of the accompanying repertoire develops further musicianship, and an awareness of its specific demands. One aim of the course is to prepare students for future employment as professional accompanists.

- *Aesthetic maturity and a sense of historical development of styles and genres of music
- *Advanced musical literacy and understanding of musical forms
- *Ability to work in partnership with other performing artists
- *Increased confidence as a pianist and vocal coach

MATERIAL TO BE COVERED AND METHOD OF PRESENTATION:

Repertoire for this course is chosen jointly by the student and conductor with consideration of available soloists and ensembles. The students in this course will meet bi-weekly for a group seminar session, and individually with the instructor during alternate weeks. One or more concerts each semester will provide opportunities for the students to demonstrate their abilities.
