To paraphrase Aristotle, a person's character is shaped by their habits; wallow in filth and cruelty and you will become filthy and cruel. Conversely, a person who immerses themselves in noble pursuits will over time, become noble. In PHIL2120-1 ETHICS, we will heed the advice of Aristotle and immerse our selves in the study of Ethics, morality, and the pursuit of the answer to the question of what is good and why. We will be drawing from the entire history of Ethics, ancient and modern, but will not restrict ourselves to theory alone as we will also try to apply the various perspectives on ethics to some classic and contemporary conundrums. This course will be stimulating and fun, and, if you take you education seriously, ennobling.
