CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course is an introduction to the basic concepts, techniques and media of drawing, through disciplined observational and imaginative study.

Prerequisite(s): ARTH*1220, ARTH*1520, SART*1050, SART*1060 (ARTH*1220 and SART*1060 can be taken as co-requisites.)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Drawing I introduces the fundamentals of drawing emphasizing aspects of form including line, shape, proportion, light values, volume, perspective and composition. Observational drawing will include still life, the human figure and architecture. Imaginative drawing including abstract, non-representational, and conceptual approaches will also be explored. Contemporary drawing concepts and issues will be featured through in-class presentations, demonstrations and class discussion.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Students will have developed an ability to observe and interpret visual elements of form and apply them to representational and non-representational drawings. They will gain familiarity with the materials and tools of drawing and also proper presentation and storage.
- Students will develop significant visual literacy and communication skills necessary to analyze and discuss drawings, in terms of formal, technical and content analysis.
- Students will become familiar with a broad range of contemporary artworks produced by both national and international artists using drawing.
- Students will further develop their appreciation of contemporary drawing and have explored possibilities for their own place and practice within this context.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Students will be graded according to the development of their work and their engagement with the course. This means:

- Complete all in-class and out-of-class assignments in time for critiques.
- Submit work on time for grading. All drawings must be CLEARLY IDENTIFIED with your name and date on the reverse side.
- Late assignments will be penalized at a rate of 5% per day. This adds up quickly.
- Arrive at each class prepared for that day's work (materials for working and/ or projects ready for critique).
- Clean up: no tape on drawing boards, participate in group clean-up each class, return classroom to 'neutral' at the end of each class.
- Participate in critiques and class discussions.
- Participate in the class trip to Toronto galleries.
- Students can expect to devote a minimum of 5-6 additional hours per week to out-of-class assigned projects.

Students are strongly encouraged to attend lectures given in the SoFAM by visiting artists, critics and scholars.

Important notes on facilities:

- Cutting mats must be used to protect tables when using a mat knife
- Spray fixative may only be applied to drawings in the ventilated Spray Room (Alex 373). This room is key-access only. Drawings should be protected temporarily with a covering sheet of clean newsprint until an appropriate opportunity arises for applying fixative.
- The critique wall in the classroom must be kept clean and unobstructed for critiques. A roll of Kraft paper is provided in the drawing room to cover and protect the wall surface if the wall is temporarily required as a working support.

Students are strongly encouraged to attend visiting artist talks, exhibitions of art, and other relevant events that will be regularly announced in class.

LAB FEE:

A compulsory materials fee of \$50.00 will be charged for materials and services provided in support of required course projects. The amount will be invoiced by the Office of the Bursar and paid directly with your tuition payment – no additional payment is necessary. **THE LAB FEE WILL NOT BE REFUNDED AFTER THE THIRD WEEK OF CLASSES.**

Participation in class discussion and critiques

SUPPLY LIST (materials to be provided by the student)- SART*2090 - DRAWING |

The following list represents a basic kit of drawing materials and tools. Note that some items can likely be found more cheaply at a hardware or office supply store. If you're shopping at a discount store (dollar store) check that the item is strong enough to last the semester, or it won't turn out to be such a good deal.

These items may need to be replenished during the semester.

Here are the things you'll need immediately:

From an art supply store:

- Sketchbook -something simple that you can carry with you easily
- Pencils: 2H, B, 2B, 4B, 6B
- Pencil sharpener
- Bamboo brush or soft brush #6
- Compressed charcoal 1 box
- Erasers: kneadable, white 'mars plastic'

From hardware or office supply store but usually also available at art supply store:

- Sharpie marker
- Combination lock for locker
- Utility knife, masking tape
- Four Bulldog clips (large fold-back clips)

By week 3 you'll need these items too:

(art supply store):

- black conte B and 2B (6 sticks)
- white conte or white chalk pastel (6 sticks)
- Vine charcoal (small pack of 3-5)
- graphite sticks 2B, 4B, 6B a mix of think and thin if you like
- stumps: one large and one small

Bring from home:

- Water containers (small jars or plastic tubs)
- sponges
- smock, gloves (optional)
- two sealable containers for powdered charcoal and graphite

paper

- Variety of drawing papers (minimum 5 different sheets) which can be used for assignments. We'll go through this in detail first.
- Newsprint pad and cartridge pad (18" x 24" each)
- A few sheets of Stonehenge will come in handy
