CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

An extension of SART*2090 which attempts to foster understanding of the basic skills and technical issues necessary to the making of drawings while introducing the philosophical and critical issues related to the discipline.

Prerequisite(s): ARTH*1220, ARTH*1520, SART*1050, SART*1060, SART*2090 *Restriction(s):* Registration is limited to students registered in the Art History or Studio Art specializations of the Bachelor of Arts program with an average of 70% in all ARTH and SART course attempts.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Drawing II continues the development of observational skills and conceptual concerns introduced in Drawing I. Image presentations, readings, gallery visits, individual discussion and class group critiques of completed projects will provide a forum to develop the student's critical and conceptual skills. Students will be challenged to engage a myriad of forms of contemporary drawing practice.

NOTE: This is a 0.5 credit course. Each week, students are expected to spend approximately 4 – 6 hours outside of class on related course work.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Students will have advanced both their competence in drawing and their conception of what drawing might be. They will have developed an understanding of a variety of approaches to pictorial composition. Students will begin to develop a critical language to speak about contemporary drawing.
