### **Calendar description**

This is an advanced course that focuses on a specific theme, subject, or technique in sculpture. Subject matter will vary according to the instructor or instructors and will consist of topics not otherwise available in the curriculum. Topics may include, for example, Kinetic Media, Public Art, Mold Making, or Figuration and Installation. Normally, two different Topics will be offered each year.

### Prerequisite(s): SART\*3300

*Restriction(s):* Registration is limited to students registered in the Art History or Studio Art specializations of the Bachelor of Arts program with an average of 70% in all ARTH and SART course attempts.

#### **Course description**

This course explores key issues at the intersection of fabrication, architecture and public space. *The Crystal Land* will be explored thematically as an engagement with the digital world and as a narrative device; it will also aid in opening up numerous modes of seeing. Students will explore questions such as what can a body do? what can architecture do? what can an assembly do? what kinds of publics can emerge in *The Crystal Land*? Projects will facilitate the negotiation of multiple, fragmented publics and other assemblies in the space of the city. Through presentations, lectures, readings, material explorations, field trips, mock-ups and hands-on building, students should gain an understanding of the current relationship between fabrication, architecture and public spaces.

#### Learning outcomes

As part of this course, students:

- Develop a greater familiarity with multi-disciplinary contemporary art practices
- Develop more refined strategies for using the tools and materials of multi-disciplinary art production, alongside formal concerns and appropriate installation methods.
- Evaluate public spaces from a critical and urbanistic point of view

- Demonstrate digital, design and construction skills
- Create a public space while taking into account inhabitation, circulation, light and use

## Lab fees

A compulsory materials fee of \$110.00 will be charged for materials and services provided in support of required course projects. The amount will be invoiced by the Office of the Bursar and paid directly with your tuition payment – no additional payment is necessary. *The lab fee will not be refunded after the third week of classes.* 

### **Items Provided by Lab Fee**

Students in Special Topics in Sculpture have full access to all shops in the area and the tools and basic materials available in each. Additional tools and building materials will be provided to create small scale installations.

#### Assignments

This course involves individual and group work. Projects include the design and construction of elements at various scales, presentations and responses to readings, and explorations into new modes of public spaces.

#### **Participation/critiques**

The full participation of each student in this course is integral to its success. Engaged participation allows for the voicing of varied thoughts and perspectives, the interpretation of works and the communication of intentions. Communication is central as a means of connection and as a working foundation of production. The necessity of participation is most evident in the critiques at the end of each assignment. Each critique functions as an exam but is furthermore an ideal forum for the exchange of ideas and analysis.

#### <u>Safety</u>

Safety in the studio is a priority at all times. In order to ensure the safety of all participants, the safety procedures/guidelines provided by the instructor must be followed. It is your responsibility to attend any safety orientation that is provided. It is imperative that students follow all health and safety procedures and always use the appropriate safety equipment.
