Brief Course Synopsis:

Students will pursue the following general line of inquiry: is there such a thing as a queer play (or production)? What is it? If there is such a thing, does it matter? We will begin with background reading in queer theory and gay liberation. What does it mean to be a gay, lesbian, or transgendered person? What is queer identity, and is there such a thing as queer culture? How can an essentialist notion of identity (which is tied to queer civil liberties in the real world) be reconciled with postmodern notions of the construction of identity? Are identity labels a good thing, or are they obsolete? After a crash course in queer theory, we will continue to read performance theory and plays against each other. How do those who write gay and lesbian plays – or create queer performances -- negotiate the tenuous tightrope between stereotype and observed detail? There will be a special emphasis placed in this course on the significance of femininity, masculinity, drag, and the problem (or is it?) of straight female characters created by gay male writers. Is there such a thing as 'men writing female characters in drag' (and by that, I don't mean a man sitting at a computer in a dress!)? If so, what is it?
