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## **Brief Course Synopsis:**

This course will focus on the relationship between Shakespeare and the feminine writing style. After an introduction which will summarize the recent Shakespeare authorship de-bates — and the 'Italianate' aristocrat Edward de Vere as a candidate for Shakespeare — we will examine two plays by Shakespeare — Macbeth and Twelfth Night — in the context of Terry Eagleton's analysis. Then we will look at euphuism as a feminine literary style, referencing Wilde and Lena Ostermark-Johnansen. We will then plunge into a study of theories of feminine writing, referencing Simone de Beauvoir, Helen Cixous, Roland Barthes, David Savran, Daniel MacIvor's Here Lies Henry and others. Students will be marked on their contribution to class discussion, as well as essays, and each will do a re- search seminar presentation. Does it diminish Shakespeare's work to examine its relation- ship to gender, sexuality and politics? How is a 'feminist' content different than a 'femi- nine' style, and how do the two work together (or separately) to create meaning in drama?
