Brief Course Synopsis:

This reading-intensive course serves as an introduction to the critical study of literature for children.

The emphasis of ENGL*2740 this semester will be on 20th- and 21st-century texts, but we will begin the semester with a brief introduction to the history of children's literature -- and each of the course's 4 units of study will begin with study of textual traditions from centuries past. Together we will historicize, explore, and analyze fables and animal stories (unit 1), fairy tales and fantasy (unit 2), nonsense poetry and prose (unit 3), and picture books (unit 4), examining diverse representations of childhood and adulthood, gender and sexuality, race and class.

As we move our way through these varied texts, you will be introduced to many key ideas in contemporary literary studies, experimenting with analytical frameworks in discussions and in your own writing (essay exams and an optional essay).

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Quizzes (best 5 of 6) 30% Midterm exams 2 @ 20% each

Essay option: You will have the option to rework, revise, expand, and polish one of your essay answers from either of the two midterms If you select this option, your grade on the optional essay will replace that of the original exam answer, and the exam grade will be adjusted accordingly.

Final exam 30%
