Brief Course Synopsis:

This course builds on the reading and writing skills introduced in ENGL 1080 and ENGL*2940. Students in this course will deepen their understanding of the basic elements of poetry writing: form and content, line, metre, imagery, rhyme, rhythm, syntax, and metaphor. Through practical experiments, discussions, and group writing exercises, students will work on poetic forms such as the ballad, the sonnet, the blues, the villanelle, the sestina, the haiku, the ghazal, and the pantoum. Alongside this attention to form, the class will explore the histories of global poetries and their relationship to the world in which we live. Through reading assigned texts and active participation in the writing workshops students will come to know poetry as grounded in every day structures of thinking and hone their skills as creative writers, critical and complex thinkers, and editors.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Writing Exercises/Form Poem Assignments, 20%

Students will be required to participate in in-class writing exercises and to hand in the week after the lecture and exercise. These writing exercises will concentrate on poetic forms. Presentations, 20%

Students are expected to read assigned books and bring to class an analysis of the texts in relation to the elements of poetry learned.

Editing Participation, 20%

Students are expected to actively participate in all aspects of class: giving feedback to other students on their work; receiving feedback; and discussion of other assigned books and readings.

15-poem chapbook, 40%

A draft of seven of the 15 poems for the chapbook will be due by mid-term. The final chapbook is due at end of term
