Brief Course Synopsis:

This seminar will introduce students to the study of verbal art and oral traditions. We will study some of the classic folk narratives genres — including legend, folktale, and proverb — but will also emphasize forms of storytelling that currently emerge in everyday conversation, in our own communities.

This is an opportunity for English majors to expand their methodological and analytical repertoires, learning tools of fieldwork, transcription, and discourse analysis. We will explore some of the ways in which theoretical frameworks current in literary studies intersect with or differ from those in folklore studies and sociolinguistics.
