Course prerequisites: 2.00 credits or a 1000-level philosophy course.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an introduction to the nature and possibility of knowledge, in connection with the nature of mind and the role of language in shaping experience. We will look at our knowledge of the external world, language and thought, the metaphysics of mind, metaphysical freedom, and knowledge of minds.

Our primary objectives for the course are to:

- gain an initial understanding of some central philosophical debates;
- actively join those debates and generate some of our own ideas and responses; and to
- develop skills in reading and writing about complex and abstract ideas.

Ultimately, we hope to acquire a solid foundation for future work in philosophy and, perhaps more importantly, make a beginning in thinking in a structured, productive way about difficult and important topics.

REQUIRED TEXT:

• Andrew Brook and Robert J. Stainton, *Knowledge and Mind: A Philosophical Introduction* (MIT Press, 2000)

I may add additional short readings (which will be distributed through CourseLink and/or electronic reserve) to illuminate the main text and assist our discussions as we go on.

EVALUATION:

The evaluation for this course will consist in a mid-term exam (worth 20% of the final grade), a term paper (worth 40% of the grade) and a final exam (worth 40% of the grade). You do not need to pass all of the assignments in order to pass the course, but you do need to sit the final exam.

A: Mid-term Exam.

- This will be held on Thursday, **October 2nd**, in our regular classroom. During the exam you will have to answer three short-essay questions from a choice of six.
- The exam will not be open book, but you can bring a 'cheat sheet.' On both sides of a standard sheet of 8½"×11" paper you can write anything at all that you think might help you, and you can refer to that sheet (but nothing else) during the exam.

B: Term Paper.

- This term paper is due in-class on the last day of lectures, Thursday November 27th.
- I will give you a choice of topics for this paper. You may write on a different topic, of your choice, *but only in consultation with me*: that is, you should come to see me with a topic in mind—or preferably sketched out on paper—and get my approval for it. Papers written on an unapproved subject will be considered 'off-topic' and graded accordingly.
- Your essay should be between 2,500 and 4,000 words in length, or (if you prefer) eight to fourteen double-spaced pages. However this is only a guideline: the real moral is that papers much shorter than this are likely to be inadequate, papers much longer need to be carefully checked for lack of concision. In grading the essays, I will take into consideration your ability to use correctly and effectively the language appropriate to the assignment: in particular, you should strive to write grammatically, accurately, clearly, precisely and concisely. More detailed evaluation criteria and advice will be provided with the essay topics.
- Please note that essays cannot be submitted or returned via the department administrative office or through the campus mail system. Papers can be submitted by e-mail only in an emergency.
- I invite students to show me drafts of their essays: I try and will comment on, and discuss with you, successive drafts until one week before the paper deadline (i.e. November 20th). Assistance with writing essays is also available from the Learning Commons (Library, 1st floor) and from Writing Services (http://www.lib.uoguelph.ca/get-assistance/writing).

B: Final Exam.

• This will be held on Monday, **December 1**st, in a top-secret location to be announced (hopefully our regular classroom). During the exam you will have to answer four short-essay questions from a choice of eight.

• The exam will not be open book, but you can bring a 'cheat sheet.' On both sides of a standard sheet of 8½"×11" paper you can write anything at all that you think might help you, and you can refer to that sheet (but nothing else) during the exam.

The essays and exam will be graded according to standards described in <u>Section VIII</u> of the Undergraduate Calendar. Procedures for grade reassessment and information on Academic Consideration can be found in the same section.
