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Fall 2013

A seminar course primarily on Aristotle's Nicomachean Ethics, but with one seminar on Book A (12) of the Metaphysics. Requirements are two exegetical seminars or essays, depending on enrolment. Seminars can simply be essays read aloud, and essays will be backups for seminars in case the scheduled presenter is absent. They should give an exposition and interpretation of the assigned section, in the form of a commentary, referring to the Bekker numbers so we can coordinate your seminar with the text, and making reference to the secondary scholarship on reserve (25 pages works well as a seminar length; going through the text and interpretations gets you there pretty quickly). If you're enrolled in 4400 use at least two of the commentaries on reserve in addition to the translator's **notes**. Those enrolled in **6311** should consult at least **three** of the commentaries in addition to the translator's notes. Before you look at the commentaries read the text carefully and work out your own interpretation so you can bring an independent point of view to your reading. Essays are due at the beginning of the corresponding seminar because it's part of your assignment to participate in the class discussion, and to be available to give a back-up seminar, and because the extra time would give you an unfair advantage. If you miss the deadline you'd have to choose a later topic; if there are no later topics the late penalty, to be meaningful, would be 5 marks per weekday. Regular attendance is important in seminar courses to ensure an adequate audience and to create continuity of discussion. Students who don't attend regularly will be assigned a final exam.
