CLAS/ARTH*3150: Roman Art and Urbanism (0.5 credit) COURSE OUTLINE

Slide/lecture course delivered in-class three days per week.

The course focusses upon the creation and development of Roman architecture and art from its appearance until the Late Roman period in order to demonstrate the lasting impact of the physical culture of ancient Rome upon later Western Civilization. Two books are used to complement the lectures and slides presented by the instructor.

Learning outcomes:

1. students will begin to understand the second culture that helped to formulate Western concepts of form and beauty

2. students will begin to understand the purpose of critical review of material objects within a proper cultural context

3. students will develop some confidence in their ability to evaluate information in a critical manner.

Students' responsibilities:
