Brief Course Synopsis: Plunging "Outside of History": Ralph Ellison's Invisible Man

Ralph Ellison's *Invisible Man* (1952) is one of the great American novels of the twentieth century. Drawing on folklore and preaching, blues and jazz, the novel explores the tropes and traps of history and identity. Centrally concerned with sight, insight, and subjectivity, *Invisible Man* is suffused with subjective visions, hallucinations, and dreams that conflate time and space and blur the boundaries separating past, present, and future. Rejecting linear notions of history or the idea of history as a spiral, Ellison's protagonist challenges us to see how traditional views of history inhibit our ability to understand social power and political acts of oppression and exclusion.
