Brief Course Synopsis:

This course is focused on the disciplinary skill of close reading and is intended for students planning to specialize in the study of English Literature. Through a series of case studies, the course introduces students to a range of historical and national writings in prose, poetry, and drama, and to some of the key terms and concepts in contemporary literary studies. Lectures and discussions address selected works from the Renaissance onwards, the periods in which these works were produced, and some of the ways in which these texts have been or could be interpreted. ENGL*1080 and its companion course, ENGL*2080, are required for a major or minor in English. Students are encouraged to enroll in ENGL*2080 in the semester after they have completed ENGL*1080.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Group Project – 5% Close Reading Assignment 15% 350-500 words Midterm – 20% Creative Exercise – 10% Essay Intro – 5% Essay – 20% 900-1200 words Exam – 25% Texts and/or Resources Required (e.g. Internet access, specific textbook title, lab kit, etc.)

All course readings will be accessed via the web. No textbook purchases are required for this course.

Information about mode of delivery (synchronous/asynchronous/other details): This course will have one synchronous lecture per week, one synchronous tutorial per week and extensive additional interaction with students via email and online discussion.
