Brief Course Synopsis: Future-oriented, this seminar considers contemporary criticism and the theory of trauma. We situate trauma theory from its Freudian roots to its post-deconstructive methodology, and explore ways in which these approaches are productive. Then, on the basis of critiquing the foundational positions, the seminar relocates trauma theory in a postcolonial and globalized world, and addresses non-Western accounts of trauma. Additionally, considering politics and subjectivity, the course focuses on forms of repression the state gives rise to and, by implication, on human rights, biopolitics and community.
