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Brief Course Synopsis:

This reading-intensive course serves as an introduction to the critical study of literature for children. We will be historicizing, analyzing, and exploring a variety of texts -- including fairy tales and fantasy, nonsense poetry and prose, illustration and picture books, some contemporary reworkings of early forms of children's literature like didactic poetry and the "penny dreadful"-- and there will be a special focus on issues of power, authority, and representation. How have specific texts and artifacts constructed an idea of "the child" at whom they are targeted? Whose voices, stories, and perspectives are privileged in literature that is written by adults, for children? Which ones have been deemed "classic" or "canonical," and which ones have been marginalized? What is at stake?

As we move our way through assigned readings, you will be introduced to many key ideas in contemporary literary and cultural studies (by way of keywords for the study of children's literature). You will be experimenting with analytical frameworks in discussions and in your own writing. The overarching goal of this course is to provide you with tools and perspectives that can be applied to a wide range of cultural forms, beyond the reading list of this course and long after the semester's end.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Midterm exams (2 @ 20% each) 40%

essay option: you will have the option to rework, revise, expand, and polish one of your essay answers from a midterm exam. Students who select this option will have the grade on the optional essay replace that of the original exam answer, with that exam's overall grade adjusted accordingly.

Final exam 30%
