Brief Course Synopsis:

This course offers an introduction to the poetry of the long eighteenth century. The course has two primary objectives: students will come away from the course with enhanced skills for reading verse and with some knowledge of the complex social changes besetting Britain as they are registered in poetic discourse. The changing status and function of "nature" as it is presented in pastoral and early romantic verse will be an important organizing concern, but we will also be looking at the significant changes in the representation of subjectivity in poetry. As we will see the representation of British spaces and the representation of British (and non-British) peoples are thoroughly intertwined. Since this is the period in which Britain attained global imperial power, the course will constantly address how the history of empire and colonialism is mediated through literature.
