Brief Course Synopsis:

This reading intensive course explores Canadian authors, texts, histories, genres, and critics from the beginnings of the twentieth century to the present in relation to a variety of social, cultural, and historical contexts. We will read novels, poems, plays, and essays by Indigenous, colonial, and diasporic voices in order to think about problematic historiographies and intersectional experiences from across the portion of Turtle Island known as Canada.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Participation in Lecture/Reading Discussions (In-Person and Online): 10%

Close Reading Responses (350 words): $2 \times 10\% = 20\%$

Midterm Exam*: 20%

Critical Analysis Assignments (500-600 words): 15%

Final Exam*: 35%

* All exams listed will be either take-home and/or in-person depending on health and safety restrictions over the fall semester. It is too early to determine the best delivery method for the examinations in this course.

Texts and/or Resources Required (e.g. Internet access, specific textbook title, lab kit, etc.)

Final reading list to be determined. Students will read three to four novels, several short stories collections, selections of poetry, and at least one play. Paired with all primary readings will selections of essays and literary criticism. Podcast episodes will occasionally be assigned for independent listening.

Internet access will be required. Slack and/or Discord will be used for online class discussions.

Students will meet on-campus for weekly in-person lectures/discussions but also contribute to asynchronous discussions and other relaxed forms of on-going virtual chat (text and/or voice) to respond to course subject matter.
