Brief Course Synopsis:

This course explores literary depictions of the natural environment in relation to the major ecological issues that we face today. We will engage with two complementary questions: first, how do writers strive to represent natural phenomena that defy conceptualization, from the subjective experiences of a nonhuman animal to global shifts over long timescales? And second, how can literature help us to imagine and work toward environmentally just futures? Our readings will span multiple genres, from novels and memoirs to poetry, graphic fiction, and journalism. We will focus on contemporary writing, but will also read selections of landmark texts in environmental thought from the last few centuries. As we consider the benefits and limitations of different genres, students will have opportunities to put theory into practice through both critical and creative responses to our discussions. Topics to be considered will likely include climate change, petroculture, human/animal relations, racial justice, apocalypticism, gender and sexuality, and public health.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Journal of critical and creative responses: 30%

Short essays: 2 x 20% Final exam: 30%
