Brief Course Synopsis:

Course Description: The Gilded Age and the Progressive Era (1865-1920) were periods of great change: the rise of urbanization, the creation of distinct high and low cultures, the formation of modern capitalism, the revision and reaffirmation of a racial caste system destabilized by emancipation, and the creation of an overseas American empire. This course will explore how American writers instigated, defended, criticized and/or interpreted these changes. In particular, students will read novels and stories of adventure and exploration in order to examine how nineteenth-century American literature addressed issues of race, empire and democracy. Instead of presenting students with a monological approach to the period, the reading list exposes them to multiple perspectives (masculinist and feminist, black and white, conservative and progressive), so they can begin to grasp how American fiction helped to give shape and coherence to multiple, often competing, meanings about race, gender, capitalism, modernity and imperialism.
