## ON VIOLENCE

In this seminar we will examine the means by which a selection of late twentieth/twenty-first century texts from Zimbabwe and Canada address a violent and often deliberately obfuscated past and present; accommodate and bring into dialogue new stories that began to emerge through the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in Canada and in the aftermath of Civil War and its reverberations in Zimbabwe; come to terms with residual and new forms of violence bred by centuries of colonial rule followed by postcolonial/neocolonial governance; and re-assess the function of literary and artistic endeavour in grappling with violent legacies in the present.
