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Brief Course Synopsis:

This course involves intensive study of issues relating to the storytelling strategies, such as those associated with structure, imagery, and language, devised by women writers to reflect diverse experiences and perceptions, in particular their relationships to the natural world. This specific course will focus on the genres of life writing, memoir, and autobiography/auto history written in Anglo North America by women of different cultural backgrounds including Indigenous, settler, Afro-Caribbean, and Asian. We will also read a memoir by a Trans woman writer to further complicate the categories of 'women,' and memoir.
