Brief Course Synopsis:

River/Ocean/Island: The Timeplaces of the Circum-Atlantic World

This courses approaches questions of empire and colonialism from two directions. First, students will be reading a series of texts (plays, poems, prose narratives) that have dominated critical discussion of British imperialism over the last three decades. In order to allow for a certain level of depth, the course focuses on the circum-Atlantic world from the founding of the Royal African Company to the advent of the American Civil War. We will be paying attention to how intercultural relations, violence, and relations of exchange with non-European populations have been crucial for the constitution of Europe itself, of capitalism, and many of the structural developments that have come to define social norms in the wake of the enlightenment. Second, attention will be paid to counter-discourses and forms of resistance as they are articulated not only in these more canonical texts, but also in cultural productions that are in effect writing back to empire both in the past and in our current moment. We will be considering work by John Akomfrah, Yinka Shonibare, Kara Walker, M. NourbeSe Philip and other contemporary practitioners, who I would argue offer a place in the present from which to imagine the legacy of imperial fantasy otherwise. Throughout the course we will be moving back and forth between textual and visual materials, so in that regard the course offers an introduction to working at the interstices of text and image.
