Brief Course Synopsis:

This course builds on ENGL 1080 by enhancing both students' reading skills and their critical repertoire. Students will read selected texts from the literary traditions of Britain and the United States. The first part of the course uses the notion of the circum-Atlantic to raise a series of questions regarding the politics and practice of literary studies. A great deal of emphasis will be placed on developing the close reading skills required for building persuasive arguments about verse, prose and performance. In its second section, the course aims to broaden students' critical repertoire by heightening their sensitivity to historical, material and cultural factors that impinge upon literary production. This will be achieved through direct analysis of primary materials and through close interaction with critical essays on the course texts.
