Brief Course Synopsis:

For each section of ENGL*2120 the choices of focus and texts and approach are made by the instructor, then redefined by each student. Our overall topic will be "Learning To Read Critically: Interpreting the Short Story, the Novella, and the Story Sequence in Diverse Theoretical Contexts." In this pursuit, we'll draw extensively on the discussions and the examples of different schools of theory and criticism provided in a critical edition of Irish writer James Joyce's novella "The Dead" from his 1914 collection *Dubliners* with a view to comparing that novella to Canadian writer Alice Munro's novella "A Queer Streak" from her collection *The Progress of Love*. In addition, we'll have the pleasure of discussing contemporary American writer Richard Ford's story collection *Rock Springs* and additional stories selected from Munro's *The Progress of Love*. In order to achieve a more intricate sense of the nature of fictional form, technique, and style and to suggest how we ourselves might write most perceptively and most powerfully, we'll be examining creative writer Francine Prose's book *Reading Like a Writer*. Each seminar member will be asked to prepare reading journals commenting briefly on successive chapters in Prose's study.
