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Brief Course Synopsis:

This course provides an introduction to the field of postcolonial literatures, film, and other media. Broadly understood, postcolonial texts are produced in the long aftermath of global colonization that reached unparalleled heights in the 19th century and continues to reverberate in our contemporary world. One of the central features of colonialism and postcolonialism is the movement and migration of people, languages, cultures, values, raw materials, goods, and now garbage across the globe. In this course we will explore movement and migration in a selection of postcolonial 'texts' – including literature, film, social media, and visual art.
