Brief Course Synopsis:

This advanced workshop will focus on writing fiction, specifically the short story or the opening chapters plus the outline of a novel. Students will share their own writing and comment constructively on the writing of other students. Assigned texts will look at key elements of craft in a detailed and complex way. We will study the theory of creative writing but also look at how that theory is practiced by two writers in the novel and short story form. During workshopping student work, we will look at how these elements of craft are employed by students being workshopped and how they could be employed even more effectively in the rewrite to produce more polished drafts. Students will be expected to produce a portfolio of at least 7,000 words.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Assignment # 1 (10 % of grade)

Exercise: 500-1000 words on the beginning of your short story or novel

Assignment # 2 (20% of grade)

Short Story or opening chapter +outline of novel 2,000 – 3,000 words

Assignment # 3 (20% of grade)

Short Story or subsequent chapters of novel 2,500 – 3,000 words

Assignment #4 (20 % of grade)

Revise Assignment # 1 OR # 2 (or a combination with approval of the instructor). 2,000-3,000 words

Assignment (10 % of grade)

Offer lead comments on other student's short stories a few times.

Participation (20 % of grade)

Texts and/or Resources Required Paradise by Toni Morrison Unaccustomed Earth by Jhumpa Lahiri How Fiction Works by James Wood.

Synchronous: We will meet for 60-80 minutes each Tuesday at 11:30 am to workshop student work and discuss readings.

Asynchronous: Prior to the synchronous meeting, students will do some preliminary discussion of the student work and assigned readings that will be discussed at the upcoming synchronous meeting. They will do this in online forums that will run for 48 hours. There will be some taped lectures posted for listening.
