FREN 3130: Representing the Self Instructor: Dr. Dawn M. Cornelio

Description: This course is built around the French literary concept of *autofiction*, a type of lifewriting that is very interested in the ways we decide to tell our life stories – what and who we include and exclude, for example, and the language we use to tell our story. Throughout the semester, we will all read and discuss 2 novels and one short story, and each student will read two additional novels.

Delivery: Remote with live and recorded components. One class meeting per week (50 minutes) via Zoom (for Courselink), with videos, Powerpoint presentations and on-line activities to aid understanding of novels and the concept of *autofiction*, as life writing.
