COURSE OUTLINE

DESCRIPTION:

In this course we will read and discuss French and Québécois plays by twentieth-century dramatists. Our approach to the texts will center on the social, political, and cultural contexts of the plays with a focus on the role of language. We will also examine the role of theatre as it reflects and reframes changes in contemporary society. We will look at theatre as a specific genre of writing with a focus on spectacle and role-playing.

FORMAT: As a “flipped” virtual course, the format is comprised of three parts: I- independent work (asynchronous) II- live, virtual class meetings (synchronous) via Zoom and III-regular submission dates

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LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Over the course of the semester, you will:

- Examine the ways which dramatic texts engage with the **history of ideas in Québec, French Canada and France.**
- Acquire and apply **critical vocabulary in French by applying it** to: 1- the writing of a performance review and 2- regular exercises and discussions
- Identify and compare the different **theatre aesthetics** that belong to the French tradition

- Analyse the ways **theatre dialogue** is constructed and apply key concepts by creating your own theatre dialogue/monologue.
- Demonstrate **reading and writing competencies** in French commensurate with those expected in a fourth-year university course.

PREREQUISITES:1.00 credit at the 3000-level in French **RESTRICTIONS:** FREN*3120

There are three online platforms for this course: Top Hat, Top Hat Community, and Courselink. Top Hat is an online platform that shows content and interactive material. It functions as the course workbook. Top Hat Community (sometimes I will refer to it as the “THC”) is a discussion board and the official outlet for course announcements and for asynchronous discussion. The readings, weekly assignments and discussions will be managed through Top Hat.

However, the three major semester assignments (the two essays and the play review) will be submitted to the Dropbox folder in Courselink www.courselink.uoguelph.ca). Grades will be recorded in Courselink as well.

You will be able to submit answers to in-class questions using Apple or Android smartphones and tablets, laptops, or through text message. Top Hat Community

Top Hat Community is a free community platform that allows us to remotely communicate with everyone across our university, keeping our campus connected. We will be using this platform for course announcements, as well as questions and activities throughout the course. **Extra credit up to 3% points will be reserved for THC participation:**10 posts or reactions (in our course channel) equates to 1% of extra credit (up to a max of 3% points). You are urged to post your questions to this discussion platform, especially if you are seeking clarification about course assignments. Everyone benefits that way, and it helps your instructor manage email flow.

How to join Top Hat Community

Before proceeding, make sure that you have created a Top Hat account and enrolled in our Top Hat course using the steps linked above.

- Step 1: Go to <https://login.tophatblue.com/>, click "Login in with Top Hat," and input your Top Hat account credentials
- Step 2: Check your school email for a message from Top Hat Community to verify your email address
- Step 3: Once directed back to Top Hat Community, input your real name in the username field when prompted
- Step 4: Locate our course channel in the left-side menu

Upon entry to Top Hat Community you will find yourself in the #intros channel for your Top Hat Community campus. This is a public channel consisting of all Top Hat users at our university.

You will be automatically added to our course channel in Top Hat Community, which you can find in the left-side menu. You will notice a lecture channel beneath our main course channel, which we will use for any Virtual Classrooms we run in Top Hat. If you ever need to re-join our course channel manually, click the globe icon in the top-left menu and search the channel title **806344_francophone-theatre-fren4020** in the channel directory.

Late policy

For all major assignments (essays and critical play review), students are urged to make every effort to submit on the day of the deadline. If you are ill or need accommodation for compassionate reasons, a grace period of up to seven days will be granted. Students need only send an email to the professor before the deadline. After the seven-day grace period, a penalty of 2% a day will be applied.

For minor weekly assignments and participation, **it is not possible to submit late**, for reasons of flow and class management; however, please keep in mind that there are multiple activities and chances to earn grades throughout the semester and that each lesson or activity is weighted minimally. This is to allow for minor illness and other minor, unforeseen problems. Please do not request accommodation for these unless you have a major life event that requires a more in-depth discussion with the professor. (see “When you Cannot meet a course requirement” below). In addition, remember that participation on Top Hat Community is one way to compensate for minor assignments that have been missed.

Drop Date

Accessibility
