Course objectives: This course aims to contribute to a better understanding of how people learn languages and how to teach second/foreign languages, in general. The course aims to present an overview of the different didactic approaches to the teaching of FSL/FFL, from the history of foreign language teaching-learning methodologies, through the most important currents in order to address language teaching-learning approaches today. Students will be discussing the following topics: language as action; roles of the teacher and the learner; learning communication, grammar and vocabulary in LE; oral and written comprehension and production; interaction; use of authentic documents and technology in the classroom; evaluation; action-based perspective, CEFR, task-based instruction and textual genres in the FLE class, plurilingual approach, translanguaging, neurolinguistic approach, etc. We will also touch on artificial intelligence and gamified learning vs. game-based learning.

In parallel with this theoretical component, we will establish a relationship with practice, through discussions, the development of a pedagogical portfolio, and projects, practical activities, the observation of some courses and / or their own experiences as learners of a foreign language and / or second.

Course material: All materials will be available via Course Link.

Delivery/Method of Presentation: Class meets **3 hours per week**: 2 hours of discussion in the group, and 1 hour of workshop (individual+ teams).

The course will be conducted entirely in French.

The evaluation will be made from the same theme of interest, a "mini-research topic" chosen by the student at the beginning of the course and presented in different ways: abstract, oral presentation, article. It may be a teaching-learning methodology or an aspect of the Didactics of FLE/FLS (language as action, grammar, vocabulary, oral production, written production, FLE/FLS, plurilingualism, etc.).
