**Course Description:**

The course is a close study of Kant's Political Writing with special focus on justice, democracy, rights, and constitution-making. Students are encouraged to critically engage and reflect upon these topics by way of discussion and presentation in the class. The aim is to realize and appreciate the significance of Kant's work for contemporary political institutions and ideas.

**Course Format:**

The course is organized as an online course that is centered on a seminar format. Weekly readings will be done and discussed in a discussion forum. Notes for these readings will be made available prior to their due date on the class schedule. Tests are given after one third of the material has presented. Finally, an essay will gauge students understanding of Kant's political writings. I will be available throughout the course either by email or through the discussion board

**Learning outcomes:**

- Students should acquire better communicative (both in writing and oral forms) skills.
- Students should develop a good understanding of the history of the development of the idea of justice in Kant's work.
- Students should be able to formulate a critical position on such ideas as right and justice.
- Students should acquire a sense of Kantian moral reasoning.
- Students should get an improved sense of critical and analytic competencies—vis a vis Contemporary political issues.
