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1 Course Details

1.1 Calendar Description

This is an advanced and specialized course in individual studio work, which affords students opportunities for interdisciplinary and collaborative approaches and oversees the development of independent study strategies. Students will research and complete a major self-directed project. This course is not intended for all Honours students. This course is intended to assist in the preparation for graduate school and professional activities in the Arts.

Pre-Requisites: A minimum of 0.50 credits at the 4000-level in Studio Arts, a

minimum cumulative average of at least 80% in SART courses and ARTH courses, 6.50 credits in SART and ARTH.

Courses and Airth Courses, 0.50 credits in OAIrt and Airth

Restrictions: Instructor consent required. Selection is by a process of

portfolio submission and interview.

1.2 Course Description

This course is primarily a self-directed studio production course. It is scheduled twice a week, three hours per class. Typically, one of these classes will be a seminar/lecture and the other a work period. Seminars will focus on contemporary art and related readings, organized thematically.

You will find the seminar readings and supporting visual material in Courselink. The content and the syllabus will be posted before the first class.

This course is designed to afford you ample time for individual studio production; with the encouragement of your professor, GTA and, most importantly, a community of other artists. Each student plays a key role in developing and contributing to this supportive, dynamic and

critical class community.

Participation in scheduled group activities and critiques is essential. Mid-semester and final critiques function as exams. Attendance at critiques is mandatory.

Attending local exhibitions, museums, visiting artist lectures, etc., is part of the coursework. This research will help you understand how your work relates to contemporary art in Canada and internationally.

You are also invited - and expected - to explore resources available on campus. Pursue your research and inspiration in an interdisciplinary spirit.

This is a 1.0 credit course. Students are expected to spend approximately 8 – 12 hours OUTSIDE of class time each week on related coursework.

Professionalism (15%)

 Creative communities form and thrive in an environment that fosters curiosity,
 exploration, expression and conversation. Such an environment is co-created by all
 the members of the class. And it's the kind of environment that fosters terrific art.
- Professionalism means having your work ready for critique days, and submitting work on time for feedback.
- Professionalism thrives outside of classroom hours too by making use of the studio outside of class, you develop the skills and habits of working in and maintaining a shared workspace, and cultivate the joys of friendship, discussion and occasional silliness.

This is a 1.0 credit course. Students are expected to spend approximately 8 – 12 hours OUTSIDE of class time each week on related coursework.

7.5 Accessibility
