

## Brief Course Synopsis:

The question before us is this: why theatre? Is theatre still relevant in the digital age, and if so what good is it? Using Peter Brook's four categories of theatre as a starting point for analysis, we will examine deadly theatre, rough theatre, holy theatre and immediate theatre, always with an eye to the difference between drama, live performance and disembodied performance (i.e. digital apps and film). We will let Jordan Tannahill define deadly theatre for us, and then apply McLuhan's theories and Auslander's ruthless critique of liveness to the present day state of performance. Is live performance relevant anymore, and in the age of recurring pandemics, is it even possible? Jauss's reception theory is one approach to what will challenge us in any medium (or what might not). We will then attempt an understanding of holy theatre and ritual through Schechner, Greek Tragedy, Shakespeare, Artaud, Fornes, and Amiri Baraka. What is ritual, and what is its relationship to theatre, and to the internet today? With Brecht, Boal and absurdism we explore rough theatre. Finally, we will try and discover what if anything can be immediate about live performance in this digital world, through Adorno, Diana Taylor, and Cage.
