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## Brief Course Synopsis:

This course will focus an introduction to scenography. The goal of this course is to expose, explore and develop methods of visual communication within the design process of scenography. Students are given a rigorous schedule that will foster quick and gestural solutions creating an environment conducive to the project or play assigned. Students will then begin to learn how to find and apply research as it relates to a design. It is important to have a clear understanding of how the piece moves. Emphasis will be given in learning how to break down the movement of a play . Students are encouraged to find a personal response that can be inspired from the world around them including art and architecture or even their own imagination. There will be occassional presentations at top of class to present professional design work from around the world to allow students to see directions and movements in scenography.
