Brief Course Synopsis:

This graduate seminar explores how theatre and performance histories contribute to different constructions and understandings of humanity across diverse places and centuries. Students will thoroughly discuss playwrights, theatrical venues, historical source material, revisionist practices, and performance aesthetics to encounter and reconsider historical events, beliefs, characters/figures, audiences, and perceptions of the past. Examples from diverse global cultures, communities, and time periods will engage with the mutability of supposedly stable historical events through compelling performance material. We will ask questions about who writes and/or performs different histories while learning to identify key features of the political/social conditions of performances to challenge diverse accepted historical narratives.
