## Brief Course Synopsis:

Throughout this distance education course, learners apply critical skills for close reading of various forms of media by applying an informed and politically engaged frame, so as to gain a better understanding of the underlying power dynamics that shape different forms of media and media messages. A goal is to develop an awareness of the tactics employed by media institutions, and to consider how these tactics construct and manage, in both positive and negative ways, human perceptions of the world. Attention is given to digital storytelling as a medium of communication. Issues of identity formation frame many of the approaches, including Trans, BLM, and Indigenous lives. Learners are encouraged to work with media and share a story of their choosing.
